INDONESIA FORUM: AN OVERVIEW

The University of Melbourne pioneered Indonesian studies in the mid-1950s, in recent years Indonesian studies has seen impressive growth in student numbers, staffing and the diversity of Indonesia-related subjects offered to students. Since 1997 Professor Arief Budiman has held appointment as the inaugural Professor of Indonesian Studies in the Asia Institute (formerly Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies) in the Faculty of Arts. Research and teaching relating to Indonesia is also conducted across a wide range of other Departments, Faculties and Centres, including Architecture, Building and Planning, Economics and Commerce, Engineering, Law and Medicine

Formed in 1991, the Indonesia Forum (IF), previously known as the Indonesia Interest Group, is an informal and open network of academics and administrative staff of the University who share a common interest and professional involvement in Indonesia. Members keep in touch by email and hold regular meetings, seminars and discussions. For the past ten years, the IF has hosted major functions, which have brought together the wider Melbourne Indonesian and Indonesia-interested community on campus.

The Forum also plays a policy advisory role on Indonesia-related issues within the University and works closely with the Asia Institute and the Asialink Centre, whose missions are related but more broadly oriented towards Asia as a whole. The Forum also maintains close links with the Indonesian Discussion Group, the Indonesian Postgraduate Students Association, Indonesian students and domestic students studying in Indonesia-related areas. Since 1999 the Forum has convened six-monthly postgraduate roundtables for students studying in Indonesia-related fields.

The Forum maintains an email bulletin to keep members up to date with Indonesia-related events on campus and elsewhere, including Indonesia. Its website <www.indonesiaforum.unimelb.edu.au> provides Indonesia-related information for staff, students, prospective students and colleagues from other institutions.

CONVENOR'S REPORT 2006

This year's Indonesia Forum main event was held on 15 November at the Open Stage in the Arts Centre Building. An appreciative audience of around two hundred people enjoyed performances of music and dance from West Java. These comprised two distinct styles: Sundanese (featuring Melbourne Gamelan Degung and the dancer Soepri Soehodo) and Cirebon (featuring Putri Panji Asmara with the dancer Michael Ewing performing the topeng dance). The audience included representatives from the Indonesian Consulate-General in Melbourne, members of the Indonesian community, present and former colleagues and students from the University and from other Victorian universities, and interested members of the public. The event was well reported on the Asia Pacific program of Radio Australia. After the performance, participants and audience enjoyed the Indonesian food customarily provided after the Forum main event.

By a happy coincidence, on the same day an informal Round Table chaired by Professor Julian Disney under the auspices of The Neighbours Program was held at the University to discuss progress, problems and opportunities for interaction between community organisations in Australia and Indonesia. Participants included Dr Indah Suksmaningsih (Chair, International NGO Forum on Indonesian Development INFID), Ms Huzna Zahir, (Chair, Indonesian Consumers Organisation YLKI), Mr Chalid Muhammad (Executive Director, Friends of the Earth Indonesia WALHI) and Mr Saleh Partaonan Daulay (Youth Vice President, Muhammadiyah) as well as representatives from various Australian non-government organisations. After the Round Table, the Indonesian visitors were able to have informal discussions with a number of members of the Indonesia Forum and to attend the music and dance performance in the evening.

Postgraduate Roundtable meetings were held on 6 May and 28 October in the Music Faculty Room at 210 Berkeley Street, Carlton which is the home of the University's gamelan instruments. The purpose of these Roundtables is not to replicate presentations at academic conferences. Rather, they enable postgraduates to talk about their research with their peers; to meet, network, socialise and exchange news, ideas and information; and help to reduce any feelings of marginality and loneliness that they may experience. They are now a well-established tradition, this year's being the 14th and 15th in the series. As in previous years, they are evidently satisfying a clientele wider than postgraduates at the University of Melbourne, as participants (among them presenters) included postgraduates from several neighbouring universities. Altogether there were 36 participants (including nine presenters) at the May meeting and

31 participants (including ten presenters) at the October meeting.

An innovation in this year's report is the inclusion of a new Appendix listing Indonesian theses completed at the University of Melbourne from 1954 to 2006, as identified from the University Library catalogue. Future annual reports will only list theses completed in the year under report, and the full list will appear on the Indonesia Forum website. The cumulative list this year contains as many as 192 theses, commencing with an MA thesis by Herbert Feith in 1954. It includes a few bachelor's level theses (especially from Architecture and Building) as well as about twenty different kinds of master's theses (notably Arts, Agricultural Science, Law, Engineering Science and—more recently—Nursing). There are 55 PhD theses in the list, and what stands out about them is when they were done and who wrote them. From the first PhD thesis by Peter Polomka in 1973 up to 1996 there were only nine PhD theses. Four of their nine authors had Indonesian names; the remainder did not. Of the 46 PhD theses completed from 1997 to 2006, 37 had Indonesian names and only nine did not. The list demonstrates a dramatic growth over the last decade in the number of PhD theses completed as well as in the proportion of their authors originating from Indonesia. This in turn confirms the importance of the postgraduate Roundtables.

Another significant event organised by the Indonesia Forum (in association with the University Bookshop) was the launch of two books on 18 August by Sidney Jones, the Southeast Asia Project Director for the International Crisis Group, in front of an audience of about 70 people, including the Indonesian Consul-General in Melbourne, Mr M Wahid Supriyadi. Based in Jakarta, Sidney is a well-known and respected analyst and commentator on conflict and human rights issues in South East Asia who has often appeared on current affairs TV programs like Lateline. She warmly commended the books, which were Charles A Coppel (ed) *Violent Conflicts in Indonesia: Analysis, Representation, Resolution* (Routledge, 2006) and Jemma Purdey, *Anti-Chinese Violence in Indonesia, 1996-1999* (ASAA in association with Singapore University Press, 2006).

Staff and students of the Indonesia Program (Asia Institute) published the first two issues of INDONEWS, a new quarterly newsletter for those interested in Indonesian studies and events related to Indonesia. These issues can be downloaded from <www.asiainstitute.unimelb.edu.au/programs/indonesian/indonews.html>. In October the Indonesia Program and Melbourne University Indonesian

Students' Association (MUISA) jointly hosted the Indonesian [Indië] Film Festival and Seminar. In another event in October which was co-sponsored by the Indonesia Program and the Asialink Centre, the poet Putu Oka Sukanta gave a talk, with a reading of his poetry, and a film was screened.

Indonesia Forum members were showing themselves to be high achievers in 2006. The Director of the Asian Law Centre and Co-Director of the Centre for the Study of Contemporary Islam, Tim Lindsey, was appointed to the prestigious position of Federation Fellow and was also awarded a Carrick Citation for Outstanding Contributions to Student Learning. He also continued to serve as a member of the Board of the Australia-Indonesia Institute, as did Alison Carroll the Director of Arts Program of the Asialink Centre. Arief Budiman, Foundation Professor of Indonesian Studies, was honoured with the Achmad Bakrie Award by the Freedom Institute (Centre for the Study of Democracy, Nationalism and Market Economy) for his lifetime achievement in the Social Thought category. Howard Dick, the Co-Director of the Australian Centre for International Business, was promoted to Professor. Indonesia Forum members were also prominent in the Asian Studies Association of Australia (ASAA), the peak Asian Studies body in Australia. Michael Leigh, the Director of the Asia Institute, was elected ASAA President, and Kate McGregor, Lecturer in Southeast Asian History, was elected as a General Councillor of the ASAA. Howard Dick continued his important role as editor of the Southeast Asia Publication Series of the ASAA, and Maila Stivens, the Director of the Gender Studies Unit, took over the editorship of the *Asian Studies Review*, the ASAA journal. A number of these achievements and the book launch were celebrated in an article in UniNews ('Indonesianists make waves in Asian Studies').

In last year's report, Sander Adelaar referred to initiatives taken in 2005 to help rebuild the higher education sector in Aceh following the disastrous tsunami in late 2004. In September 2006 the Aceh Research Training Institute (ARTI) program was established with funding from AusAid to build research capacity in Aceh. ARTI is a three-year commitment between four Indonesian and eight Australian universities supported by both the Myer Foundation and the Australian Agency for International Development (AusAID). It is under the direction of Indonesia Forum member Michael Leigh at the University of Melbourne and Professor Bahrein Sugihen at Syiah Kuala University (Unsyiah) in Banda Aceh. focusing on the revitalisation of the

Aceh Research and Training Institute (ARTI) located at Universitas Syiah Kuala in Banda Aceh. Its focus is on building research capacity and providing critical skills for a new generation of Acehnese living in a significantly changed society.

The Australian International Health Institute (AIHI) was also active in providing support for Aceh. Krishna Hort provided technical advice to the Provincial Health Office in Aceh under the AusAID funded HARAP program to complete the Health Sector Development Strategic Plan (Renstra) which is now in use throughout the districts of Aceh. The AIHI is also engaged in a joint project with the Royal Children's Hospital, World Vision Australia and the University of Gadjah Mada in providing technical support and resources for the redevelopment of the district hospital in Meulaboh, West Aceh; for improvements in surveillance and primary health care for sick children in the District Health Service, West Aceh; and is developing a model for community mental health services in West Aceh and in Banda Aceh. It is also involved in Aceh Partnerships in Health (APIH) (2006-2008), a joint project with Burnet Institute and World Vision Australia, which is providing technical support and resources to non government and government organisations in the health sector operating in neglected areas, including HIV-AIDS, disability, mental health and adolescent health. APIH has also supported the conduct of a study into finance needs for future health services in Aceh

The year was another successful one for research activity. Indonesia Forum members continued to be productive in publication, including two sole-authored books and two edited volumes as well as many chapters of books, articles in academic journals and contributions to the media. Tim Lindsey of the Asian Law Centre in particular had an outstanding year: he was appointed as a Federation Fellow, a position funded by the Australian Research Council (2006-2011), to research 'Islam and Modernity: Syari'ah, Terrorism and Governance in South-East Asia'; he began research with Amanda Whiting also of the Asian Law Centre, together with Andrew Kenyon and Tim Marjoribanks, on their ARC Discovery Grant project (2006-2009) 'The Media and ASEAN Transitions: Defamation Law, Journalism and Public Debate in Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore'; he completed his ARC Discovery Grant project with Professor Barry Hooker of the ANU on 'Islamic Law in Contemporary Indonesia'; and he commenced research on his ARC Discovery Grant project 'Islamic Law in Contemporary Malaysia, Singapore and Brunei:

The Anglo-Malay Madhhab'. Kate McGregor of the Department of History was successful in securing an ARC Discovery Grant (2007-2009) for her project 'Islam and the politics of memory and identity in post-authoritarian Indonesia'. Sander Adelaar and Michael Ewing of the Asia Institute commenced work on their ARC Discovery Grant project (2006-2008) 'Dialect variation in Javanese: an integrated historical-linguistic and typological analysis'. Michael Ewing continued to work on 'Cross-linguistic study of endangered Maluku languages', a research project funded by the Hans Rausing Endangered Languages Major Documentation Project and by an ARC Discovery Grant (2003-2006) held jointly with various other scholars. Jacqueline Siapno of the Department of Political Science and the Asia Centre commenced work on her ARC Discovery Grant project (2006-2008) 'Dance, Movements and Visual Symbolism in East Timor, minds and souls of East Timorese'. Maila Stivens commenced work on her ARC Discovery Grant project 'Imagining the Asian Child: towards an Anthropology of New Asian Childhoods'.

The Indonesia Forum would not have been able to engage in its activities without the help of many other organisations and supporters at Melbourne University. Once again, the International Relations Office provided the Forum with its budget for 2006. The Forum is grateful for this support and expresses its thanks to Elizabeth O'Keefe, the Manager (International Relations), for her support over many years. This was, however, the last year in which the Forum was funded from this source. Funding from 2007 is coming from the office of the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Frank Larkins, and the Forum is grateful to Professor Larkins for providing this ongoing support.

We are most grateful for the memorable performances by the gamelan groups Melbourne Gamelan Degung and Putri Panji Asmara and dancers Michael Ewing and Soepri Soehodo at the main event. The success of an event of this kind could only occur through the contribution of many people. As well as the performers, the various organisers and volunteers should be congratulated. The contribution of Amelia Fauzia deserves special mention in this context. Venues for various functions of the Forum were made available by the School of Creative Arts, the Music Faculty, the Asia Centre and the Melbourne University Bookshop.

As always, the Indonesia Forum is especially grateful to Helen Pausacker and Sander Adelaar for the invaluable help it received in organising its events

and for their advice and guidance. Special thanks also to the deputy convenor, Kate McGregor, for all her support in planning and organising the events. Also many thanks to Amelia Fauzia and Hani Yulindrasari, who organised the Postgraduate Roundtable Meetings, and to Andy Fuller, who helped to compile the Indonesia Forum's Annual report for 2005. The Forum also benefited greatly from the support it received from Tim Lindsey and Kathryn Taylor from the Asian Law Centre.

Australia Indonesia Muslim Exchange

Since 2002, Asia Institute in partnership with the ANU has been managing on behalf of the Australia Indonesia Institute an exchange program for young Indonesian and Australian Muslim leaders. Under the program young Muslim leaders from Indonesia and Australia visit each others' countries for approximately two weeks to meet both Muslims and non-Muslims to exchange views and share experiences. Since the Program's inception in 2002, over 40 young Indonesian Muslim leaders have visited Australia, and two groups of Australian Muslims have travelled to Indonesia.

Partnership in Education and Training of Regional Islamic Institutions

This project is designed to upgrade the qualification of selected teaching staff at Islamic educational institutions (IAIN/STAIN) outside Java, and thus improve the quality of Islamic education in Indonesia. The program was established in 2004, is funded by DFAT and jointly coordinated by Asia Institute and the Faculty of Asian Studies, ANU. It provides an opportunity for Indonesian MA graduates from Islamic Institutes to visit Australia for one year, to experience postgraduate training, and to familiarise themselves with day-to-day living in Australia. This project promotes cultural awareness and enhances Indonesian/Australian relations. Indonesian postgraduates sent to Melbourne have been working with Professor Arief Budiman and Professor Michael Leigh from Asia Institute, together with Professor Tim Lindsey (Law), Professor Howard Dick (Economics and Commerce) and Professor Joseph Lo Bianco (Education) to extend their home-country Masters theses and to explore how to place their research projects within a comparative perspective.

It is published four times a year, for those interested in Indonesian studies and events related to Indonesia. Paradisec has received a collection of tapes and notes in Asmat (Papua) from the estate of Calvin Roesler, a missionary who worked in Papua in the 1950s. Paradisec is digitising the tapes and has made images of the notes to put online. It has also imaged and made available online 145 sets of notes from Arthur Capell's estate related to Indonesia (<http://paradisec.org.au/fieldnotes/03.htm>). It has begun accessioning David Goldsworthy's large tape collection of Indonesian music. Other Indonesian work recently accessioned includes Gayo (Sumatra) tapes from Domenyk Eades and tapes in Muna (South East Sulawesi) recorded at a fieldwork class run by Jane Simpson. In 2007 we will be digitising Mark Durie's Acehnese tapes, which include a dialect survey of the area affected by the tsunami, which means that these tapes are now a record of dialects that are no longer spoken.

ASIALINK ARTS PROJECTS – ARTS RESIDENCIES

Asialink's Residency Program offers residencies in Visual Arts, Performing Arts, Arts Management and Literature. They aim to provide opportunities for Australian artists, performers, writers and arts managers to live and work in the Asian region.

Residencies are usually of three to four months duration and each residency offers a specified amount of funding and initial contacts. Artists are generally attached to a host institution and are expected to pursue their own work as well as participate in the life of the organisation and community. This includes giving workshops and public lectures. Every residency is different and negotiated individually.

Residencies are open to all visual and performing artists, writers and arts managers who are Australia citizens or have permanent residency status in Australia and who have at least three years experience in their field.

In a three week programme over December 2005 – January 2006, four guest Indonesian teachers - Ibu Isnawati Abs and Pak Sudirham, from South Sulawesi, and Ibu Maria Anggororini and Pak Tri Kartika Rina, from Yogyakarta, arrived in Melbourne to participate in the delivery of the inaugural Indonesian Endeavour Language Teacher Fellowships (ELTF) programme, managed by Asialink's Asia Education Foundation. Dr Aline Scott-Maxwell continued in the position of Indonesian Studies Library Consultant, based in the Asia Institute, but reduced her fraction to 0.1 (one day a fortnight). Her appointment at the University of Melbourne is part of a co-operative arrangement with Monash University Library, where she is Senior Asian Studies Librarian and Southeast Asian Studies Librarian. This shared position is made possible by the Melbourne-Monash protocol and the Asian Libraries in Melbourne consortium, which promotes resource sharing between University of Melbourne and Monash University libraries and reciprocal access to their Asian collections.

Other Library staff changes relevant to the Indonesia Forum were the resignation of Pat Knight, the Collection Management Librarian, and the appointment of Sally-Anne Leigh as Director, Information & Education Services. Sally-Anne came to the Information Division from the CSIRO Library and the ANU Library, where she was Manager of the Asia Pacific cluster, amongst other positions held. She has an undergraduate degree in Asian Studies from ANU, with a specialisation in Indonesian and Javanese, and worked for many years in Jakarta as a translator and interpreter for the Indonesian Government. Richard Serle, the Pitt Officer, assisted to build the Library's Indonesian collection in the area of acquisitions.

The Library continued to develop its collections of Indonesia-related material in 2006. A total of 383 books were acquired, covering Indonesian politics and government, religion, history, anthropology, language, law, education, mass media, architecture and music. The majority of titles were purchased from the Library's allocation to the Asia Institute and from the Pitt Bequest, which was established to support the work of the Department of History through purchasing books. Further additions to the collection came from duplicates received by Monash University Library and donations made by Melbourne University postgraduates, staff and others.

TSUNAMI RELIEF

The Medical Faculty of Gadjah Mada University is making a major contribution to the reconstruction of health services in Aceh, through a focus on the rehabilitation and development of local human resources. The University of Melbourne is providing valuable support to this vital work. The Centre for International Child Health at the University of Melbourne and Royal Children's Hospital assisted in several ways. They are providing the international evidence-base and technical advice for strategies that have been adopted, assisted in the design and evaluation of the programs, and have extensively reviewed Gadjah Mada's health programs in Aceh in January and July 2005, 2006 and 2007. Dr Ida Safitri, paediatrician from Gadjah Mada is doing a research higher degree through the University of Melbourne on the impact of IMCI training and other interventions on the health of Acehnese children after the tsunami. This work has led to broader collaboration between the Medical Faculty GMU, World Health Organization and the Indonesian Paediatric Association on strategies to

improve the quality of hospital care for children in Aceh and other pilot provinces throughout Indonesia.

PROJECTS / RESEARCH

Indonesia – Aceh

Technical support to the Provincial Health Office in Aceh to finalise the Health Sector Development Strategic Plan (Renstra). Krishna Hort provided technical advice under the AusAID funded HARAP program to complete the Renstra, which has been approved by the Governor and Minister of Health, and is now in use throughout the districts of Aceh.

Supporting Human Resource Development and Health Services Reconstruction in Aceh Barat and

Nanggroe Aceh Darussalam Province (2005-2007). This joint project with Royal Childrens Hospital (RCH), World Vision Australia and the University of Gadjah Mada (UGM), Jogjakarta, provides technical support and resources for the redevelopment of the District hospital in Meulaboh, West Aceh; for improvements in surveillance and primary health care for sick children in the District Health Service, West Aceh; and is developing a model for community mental health services in West Aceh and in Banda Aceh. It is based on the strong relationships and collaboration between the Faculties of Medicine and Psychology at UGM, and the teaching hospital in Jogjakarta, dr Sarjito, with the hospital and health service in West Aceh.

Aceh Partnerships in Health (APIH) (2006-2008), a joint project with Burnet Institute and World Vision Australia, provides technical support and resources to non government and government organisations in the health sector operating in neglected areas, including HIV-AIDS, disability, mental health and adolescent health. APIH has also supported the conduct of a study into finance needs for future health services in Aceh.

Indonesia – Papua

AIHI participated as a short term consultant to UNICEF Indonesia on the joint AusAID-UNICEF design team for the program Improving Maternal Health in Eastern Indonesia (IMHEI), conducted in Papua Province.

East Timor

Krishna Hort was contracted by AusAID to revise the design for a Health Seeking Behaviour Study planned for East Timor in 2007. The study seeks to understand the reasons for people attending or inhibiting people from attending community health services in the new nation. AIHI has been collaborating with staff from the Department of Anthropology in preparing to tender to implement the research.

The CIMH has a strong history of collaborative partnerships with leaders in mental health systems development and services in Indonesia, particularly with the University of Indonesia. CIMH Director, Associate Professor Minas with Dr Benedetto Saraceno of WHO Geneva, assisted the Ministry of Health to develop the Ministry's mental health plan for Aceh. Several of the key leaders for mental health systems and policy development in Indonesia are past graduates of a Melbourne-Harvard Mental Health Leadership Program (iMHLP). MUSIC

The Faculty maintains three sets of gamelan (Javanese, Sundanese and Cirebonese musical instruments/orchestras), representing most of the main gamelan traditions of Indonesia, as well as a set of wayang kulit and a *kacapi-suling* ensemble. To provide an inter-faculty forum for the sharing of information about Indonesia such as news of current events, visitors, university systems and contacts between the University of Melbourne and universities in Indonesia.

To develop knowledge of how to establish contacts in Indonesia for the purposes of research, inter-university linkages and exchange programs, and marketing education programs at the University of Melbourne.

- To broaden knowledge within the University of existing and potential institutional linkages with Indonesia.
- To increase awareness of such international education agencies as IDP and AEC.
- To host visits by Indonesians to the University of Melbourne.
- To share experiences in cross-cultural communication with Indonesians
- To disperse information on opportunities in relation to Indonesia with the various faculties at the University of Melbourne.
- To make policy recommendations to the International Programs Committee (previously the International Policy Advisory Group).
- These Terms of Reference were originally formulated in 1992 for the Indonesia Interest Group. After the University's formal recognition of the Country Forums, the Convenors of the existing groups expanded on the Terms of Reference for the Indonesia group to create a new document which includes terms of reference and operational guidelines for all Country Forums. The Terms of Reference for the Country Forums are reproduced below.

APPENDIX 2:

Terms of Reference for Country Forums

The Country Forums have been established to encourage and develop inter-faculty communication between academics, administrative staff, graduate students from the University of Melbourne, and other interested persons who have international teaching, research and other international interests.

In 1996, the Country Forums were granted formal recognition by the University. This is evidence of the University's commitment to internationalisation. There are currently six active Country Forums: China, India, Indonesia, Japan, Thailand and Vietnam Forum.

The Country Forum Convenors' Committee was established as a mechanism for the sharing of information and to facilitate the operation of the Country Forums. The Convenors' Committee recognises that the participation and enthusiasm of the members of each Country Forum is vital to the success of the project.

A Forum

- To provide an inter-faculty forum for the sharing of information about the countries of interest such as news of current events, visitors, university systems and contacts between the University of Melbourne and universities in the country of interest.
- To involve graduate and undergraduate students in the activities of the Country Forum.
- To encourage Departments to involve visiting scholars in the activities of relevant Country Forum(s).

Country Liaisons

- To broaden knowledge within the University of existing and potential institutional linkages with academics, universities and agents in the country of interest.
- To develop and nurture knowledge of how to establish contacts in the country of interest for the purposes of research and inter-university linkages and exchange programs.
- To liaise with the University of Melbourne Alumni Chapters in the specific countries and provide assistance if required on scholarship selection and interaction with the University.

External Relations

- To assist in the dissemination of relevant information regarding the international activities of the University of Melbourne to external country groups, consulates, DFAT, Business Councils and Chambers of Commerce, where appropriate.
- To assist in the promotion of the University of Melbourne within the country of interest.

Visitors

- To liaise with Protocol on visits of Chancellery and diplomatic level visitors.
- To assist in hosting visits by academics and high profile visitors.
- To encourage academics and staff to report on visits to relevant countries of interest.
- To provide a vehicle for monitoring the experience of visiting academics to the University. (Those here for longer than one day.)

Advisory

- To share experiences in cross-cultural communication.
- To make recommendations to the Country Forum Convenors' Committee on mechanisms to improve the international activities and academic programs of the University of Melbourne.
- To act as a resource/reference group for the consideration of University strategies for each country.

Governance/Reporting

- To annually elect Convenors and Vice Convenors.
- To report annually to the Country Forum Convenors' Committee.
